This Week's Sermon: Pastor Grahame What's the Difference between Islam & Christianity

We're in a series on the difference between Christianity and other major world religions. Today, we're going to explore Islam. Almost everything we know about Muhammad comes from sources written by Muslims after his death. When he was about forty, Muhammad reported an encounter with the angel Gabriel. He gave him verses of poetry to recite. This was the beginning of his religious awakening. For the next twenty-three years he received more poetry and after his death the verses were compiled together to form what is known as the Quran.

In many ways the central characteristics of Islam were set by the character and role of Muhammad at the very start of the religion. He combined in himself the role of high priest, chief justice, general of the army and head of the state. Spiritual, legal, military and political power were unified in one person, and this deeply affected the course of the religion. Islamic tradition knows no distinction between religion and politics. A core duty of any head of state in an Islamic society is to use available power to promote and impose Islamic faith and observance.

In Islam, right action is more important than right belief. The five practices of the Islamic faith, also known as the five pillars. 1. Reciting the "Shahadah" 2. Prayer 3. Annual Fast 4. Give Alms 5. The "Hajj" (pilgrimage to Mecca) 6. Jihad. While Islam itself implies peace, as Muslims will quickly tell you, the Qur'an itself contains clear calls to violence. When Islam is opposed, the Qur'an states, and I quote, "Fight them [meaning the non-believers] so that Allah may punish them at your hands, and put them to shame." (Qur'an 9:14).

Many Arab Muslims observing the mayhem and destruction cause by ISIS in Iraq and Syria have said this, "If that is real Islam then I don't want to be a Muslim". They said that the Qur'an had produced profound disillusionment because it accentuates "God's punishment more than his love, and the use of violence to impose Islamic laws." Further, Muslims can never be certain of their own forgiveness and salvation as Christians can. They were attracted to the idea of God's unconditional love. The idea of God's love coming to us free of charge, no strings attached.


